



Public Benches Are Becoming More and More Friendly!

Deux-Montagnes, November 7, 2012 – Citizens of Deux-Montagnes will soon enjoy the use of five new public benches. Indeed, Mrs. Susan Campbell, from Deux-Montagnes, presented the City last September with two commemorative benches and the City of Deux-Montagnes has acquired three public benches made from recycled materials that will be installed in Parc Armitage (near the petanque courts).

Commemorative Benches

The two benches donated by Mrs. Campbell, bucolic in style, are identified by a registration plate commemorating the memory of the Dubuc-Gore family, Mrs. Campbell's deceased mother and grandparents. Both benches are installed near 5th Avenue and École des Mésanges (14th Avenue). This generous donation is not the first of its kind since she has already donated a first bench, located on the grounds of Holy Family Church.

Benches Made of Recycled Materials

The City has also ordered three public benches made of a mixture of concrete and polished glass powder from the Excavation Gérard Cloutier Company, in Blainville. These benches are designed to be robust, durable, and anti-graffiti. Their manufacture meets environmental standards since they are made from recycled materials that come from the Tricentris Recyclable Materials Centre. These benches will be made available to citizens starting next spring.

Whether bucolic or urban in style, the presence of these new benches will enchant citizens of all ages. With this new urban furniture in place, we will likely be able to hear the lyrics from the old French song being sung: "lovers on public benches are really nice!"
